Master Gardener Tips for May:

- Prepare containers and pots and fill with a mixture of compost and potting soil. Be creative in plant choice. Mixtures of plants such as herbs, perennials and annuals can be quite successful as long as they have the same sun and water requirements.
- Harden off seedlings for at least a week before planting. Find the last frost date for your area, and allow at least 2 weeks more before planting tender transplants such as tomatoes and corn. This year, probably into early June.
- Plant beans directly into the garden as they quickly germinate and grow as long as the soil is warm.
- Cage peonies.
- Monitor for the presence of slugs, cutworms, earwigs and tent caterpillars.
- Control weeds in the lawn by hand pulling. Use nematodes to control grubs which eat the grass roots leading to brown patches in the lawn.
- Add 3" to 4" of mulch to beds and shrubs to conserve moisture. Shredded cedar bark is best, but expensive.
- Prune roses according to type.
- Dead head faded tulips and daffodils and other spring bulbs but do not cut the leaves until they are brown.
- If you have any fritillaries or lilies (day lilies are beetle free), now is the time to watch for the red lily beetle (adult, larva and eggs). So far, removal by hand is the best way to reduce the problem.

Speaker for the May meeting *Ron Hartlen*



Ron Hartlen graduated from Dalhousie University and Nova Scotia Technical College, in 1962, as a Mechanical Engineer, and from University of Toronto with a PhD in 1968. The largest part of Ron's research experience was twenty-three years with Ontario Hydro's Research Division. The final years of his working career involved private specialist consulting to Utilities, Industry, and Research Organizations in Canada and abroad.

Much of Ron's technical work was to help resolve unique technical issues in design, start-up and troubleshooting on first-of-a-kind plant systems and equipment at Hydro's Nuclear Stations. Many of these opportunities fell squarely into Ron's specialty of unsteady aerodynamics and the resulting vibration and sound, which, of course, are very relevant in the context of Wind Turbines.

A few years back, Ron noticed a pervasive and unsettling lack of technical understanding; widespread misconceptions; and confusion, about Wind Power. Since then, he has been writing and speaking to help friends, neighbours, and the Public to better understand the unavoidable technical realities and limits of Wind Power, specifically in the Ontario context.

The subject of his talk is "*The Realities of Wind Power in Ontario*"

Looking ahead to June our speaker will be *Kristen Martyn*

Kristen Martyn is a Birder, Naturalist, an expert in Ecotourism and a Bird Feeding Specialist. Her strong passion for the natural world, led her to pursue a BSc. in Zoology and complete a Post-Graduate course in Ecotourism and Adventure Tourism Management. Kristen is the Owner of Natura Tours Inc. a bird watching and nature tour company. She is also an owner of Wild Birds Unlimited Barrie, a backyard bird feeding and nature shop. Kristen greatly enjoys teaching people about our natural world and how we can be better stewards of wildlife and our natural world.
